Big Brothers Big Sisters of San Diego County

Six Distinct 1:1 Mentoring Programs: Community Mentoring, Sports Bigs, Amachi (Mentoring Children of Prisoners), Bigs in Schools, High School Bigs, & Operation Bigs/Military Mentoring Program

The **Mission of BBBS** is to provide children facing adversity with strong and enduring, professionally supported one-to-one relationships that change their lives for the better. Being a Big Brother or Big Sister does not take a superhero; it is about sharing simple, everyday moments with a child. Community Mentoring volunteers ("Bigs") are matched with one child ("Little") and together they determine their activities based on mutual interests and their own schedules. Sports Bigs is a community mentoring program with a focus on sports. Matches meet 2 times a month to play sports and/or attend sporting events. Free or low-cost tickets to sporting events are provided to matches, and quarterly sports/health clinics are sponsored by BBBS and community partners. Amachi is a community mentoring program that matches volunteers with a child who has an

incarcerated parent. The Big and the Little have outings 2-4 times a month for a few hours each time. Bigs in Schools volunteers meet with one child once-a-week for one hour at the child's elementary school in the Mid-City to play games, sports, do crafts, and share interests.

Operation Bigs volunteers are matched with a child who has an active duty military parent who is deployable. This is also an after-school site-based program and takes place once a week for a one hour mentoring session at all five elementary schools on base at Camp Pendleton, as well as four school/community center sites in central San Diego (Coronado, Point Loma, Serra Mesa, and MCAS Miramar).

The **Big Brothers Big Sisters Vision** is for all children to achieve success in life. BBBS is especially seeking male volunteers for all programs since 80% of our waiting list consists of Little Brothers, as well as male and female volunteers who speak Spanish, to be matched with children waiting for a mentor who primarily live in the South Bay and Mid-City targeted areas of need. Volunteer mentors need to be 18 years old or older (exception for the High School Bigs program), have a valid Social Security number, and be available to volunteer in the San Diego area for at least 1 year.

The Preuss School

The Preuss School UCSD is currently looking for caring adults to serve as mentors to our students. Preuss is an intensive college preparatory middle and high school for motivated low-income students who will become the first in their families to graduate from college. Our students take on academically intensive curriculum and work hard to excel, graduate and go on to college.

Quarterly meetings are planned and activities for the mentor/mentee pairs are also scheduled throughout the year. Mentors act in a capacity of role model, teacher, and friend. Often the exchange between the pair is educational for both, as both bring their own unique experiences to their exchanges. A mentor is paired with one student, and they meet on the school's campus either during lunch or the advisory period once a week for 30 minutes. Mentors meet with their

mentee once a week for 30-60 minutes during school. Mentors and mentees develop a close bond that has lasting effects for both. Mentors must pass a DOJ/FBI background check and submit proof of tuberculosis skin test conducted with in the past 60 days.

Turning the Hearts Center (THC)

Fatherhood is Forever is a yearlong group mentoring project for middle and high school aged young men. Groups are conducted after school with a primary focus on teen pregnancy prevention, life skills development, and health education. The project starts with comprehensive 12-week teen pregnancy prevention curriculum and continues ongoing support services and mentoring to each youth and family based on individual needs and assessments. Mentors must be 21 years of age and older and are required to spend 2 hours per week with their mentee(s) during a weekly group session. Turning the Hearts Center primarily serves the South Bay community, but plans to expand services to other regions of San Diego County in the future. Now we have a total of 6 gender specific mentoring programs for youth ages 9 to 21. The names of the groups are: Boys Rise Up, 9-12 Boys to Men, 13-17 Men on the Rise, 18-21 Girls Rise Up, 9-12 Girls to Women, 13-17 Women on the Rise, 18-21
